


Clinical data





Jan – October 2018 outreach events

- Bilateral hearing loss
- Unilateral hearing loss
- Hearing aid advised
- Wax management
- Medical treatment



Total patients seen: 5470



Newborn screening (targeted screening)

- AABR screening for under weight (under 2kg) babies
- On the date of discharge they are referred to audiology for hearing screening

Main Challenges:

- Equipment
- Patients lost to follow up
- One referral source
- Limited numbers in attendance (28 so far in 2018)
- If child does not pass screening then child is seen for follow up at 3 months for possible natural sleep electrophysiological testing and subsequent behavioural
- Youngest fitted with hearing aids 2 years despite introducing screening due to difficulty confirming threshold and making ear moulds for very small babies



From the staff at QECH Audiology

Overall challenges:

- Electrophysiological testing: interference, cost of consumables, training of staff, number needing sedation
- Having the option of electrophysiological tests sometimes means less effort is given to behavioural testing attempts
- Lack of speech therapy services
- Hearing aid patients not coming back to clinic for review (no contact numbers)
- Many areas in Malawi do not have access to Ear and Hearing Care services



From the staff at QECH Audiology

Overall successes:

- Malawian audiologists employed in the clinic
- Efficient admin and data recording processes in place
- Clinical protocols
- Outreach activities to reach more people
- Follow ups for the cochlear implant programme
- Research opportunities (Malaria/Meningitis study)
- Ear and hearing care awareness sessions at local churches and schools (seeing thousands of people turn up!)
- Learning new skills and troubleshooting issues
- This centre can be a training ground for new staff to help build capacity
