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Role of CGHH & international community Importance of Primary Health Care



WHO stated, in 1978, that "**Primary Health Care** is essential health care made universally accessible to individuals and families in the community by means acceptable to them, through their full participation and at a cost that the community and country can afford. It forms an <u>integral part</u> of the country's health system of which it is the <u>nucleus</u> and of the overall social and economic development of the community."*

As such, PHC must be a **key element** in the effort to reduce the burden of ear and hearing conditions in the Developing World.

Importance of Primary Health Care Key concept 1: essential



"Primary EAR & HEARING Health Care is **essential EAR & HEARING health care (EHHC) ...**

ESSENTIAL INCLUDES:

- I. Working diagnosis (trained PHC professsionals)
- II. Appropriate instruments (equipped PHC centres)
- III. Care for all the frequent E&H conditions in the area
- IV. Follow up and referral routes to 2^{ry} & 3^{ry} EHHC
- V. Means for Prevention and Early Detection

Importance of Primary Health Care Key concept 2: universal (UHC)



"Primary EAR & HEARING Health Care is essential EAR & HEARING health care made **universally accessible** to individuals and families ...

UNIVERSAL ACCESSIBILITY INCLUDES:

- I. Locally available (within walking distance)
 Home visitation for those not able to mobilize
- **II. At least 5 days a week** + available at local Emergency services out of PHC hours.
- **III. Free or minimal contribution** (cost of 1 meal)
- IV. Individual, family and group appropriate and sensitive: Gender, Language, Age, Religion, Disability, Individual and Culture differences.

Importance of Primary Health Care Key concept 3: in the community



"Primary EAR & HEARING Health Care is essential EAR & HEARING health care made universally accessible to individuals and families **in the community** ...

Taking EHC into the community includes:

- I. PHC Centres with their "network" of Health Posts
- II. Continuous training for community workers
 - 1. On site training
 - 2. District workshops

III.Regular "2^{ry} & 3^{ry} EHC" community health visits

- 1. Health service Provision (de-centralisation)
- 2. Ear and Hearing screening
- IV. <u>CBR/CBID</u> (community based inclusive development)

Importance of Primary Health Care Key concept 4: acceptance/participation



"Primary EAR & HEARING Health Care is essential EAR & HEARING health care made universally accessible to individuals and families in the community by means acceptable to them, through their full participation.

ACCEPTANCE & PARTICIPATION INCLUDE:

- I. Talking with community leaders BEFORE planning
- II. Talking DURING planning
- III.Talking AFTER planning (during the plan execution)
- IV. Working TOGETHER with the community workers
 - 1. Early Involvement
 - 2. Early Training of Trainers
 - 3. Early Delegation of functions
 - 4. Early Empowerment

Importance of Primary Health Care
Key concept 5: affordable/sustainable



"Primary Ear & Hearing Health Care is essential health care made universally accessible to individuals and families in the community by means acceptable to them, through their full participation and at a cost that the community and country can afford.

Affordability and sustainability need to "walk hand in hand", in order to support government systems at national level; this includes the consideration to create and/or develop public-private partnerships

Importance of Primary Health Care Key concept 6: within national systems



"Primary Ear & Hearing Health Care is essential health care made universally accessible to individuals and families in the community by means acceptable to them, through their full participation and at a cost that the community and country can afford. It forms an integral part of the country's health system of which it is the nucleus and of the overall social and economic development of the community."

The integration of EHHC into a National Health Care system (EHC national strategy/plan) is a long term goal, to be achieved with the help of all health providers (local, national, international), community leaders, persons with disabilities, civil society & self-help groups.

Where are we now, 40 years later: Astana declaration, 26 October 2018



Astana Declaration on Primary Health Care: 2nd Global Conference on PHC, Astana, Kazakhstan, Oct 2018.

The Civil Society Engagement Mechanism (CSEM) group's statement aims to support the central role of PHC and desirable Universal Health Coverage (UHC), by calling on governments and development partners into action. Statement's content includes:

- Background information on EHC and "CSEM for UHC2030"
- Call on governments to:
 - Strengthen political leadership/governance
 - Improve financing
 - Enhance accountability
- Call on development partners to:
 - Advance country-led solutions (188 signatories of statement)

2017 WHA RESOLUTION calls on governments to:-


- collect quality <u>population data</u> on ear disease & hearing loss
- integrate EHC strategies within Primary Health Care systems.
- establish suitable <u>training</u> programmes in E&HC.
- ensure highest <u>vaccine coverage</u> against MMMR.
- implement <u>early screening</u> in high-risk populations (eg for CSOM, infants, children, elderly, noise-exposed).
- improve access to affordable, cost-effective, quality, assistive hearing technologies and products.
- develop/ implement regulations for <u>control of work & leisure</u> noise & control of ototoxic medicines.
- promote alternative means of communication (eg SL, captions).
- work towards <u>SDG 3</u> (healthy lives), <u>SDG 4</u> (education for all).
